From the time Alcoholics Anonymous was born, AA has taken great care to emphasize that no alcoholic can be excluded from AA. Our Third Tradition states clearly: "The only requirement for AA membership is a desire to stop drinking." You are a member if you say you are. As early as 1940, when AA was just five years old, Bill W., our co-founder, "invited two black alcoholics to attend meetings in the New York area. After hearing him speak at an institution, they asked him whether, on their release, they might join AA. Bill said yes, and a few weeks later, they appeared at a local meeting. By the mid1940s, a number of black alcoholics had found sobriety in the program. Jim S., a physician, was called the originator of AA's first black group." "An AA group ought never endorse, finance, or lend the AA name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property and prestige divert us from our primary purpose."

These adventures implanted a deep-rooted conviction that in no circumstances could we endorse any related enterprise, no matter how good. We of Alcoholics Anonymous could not be all things to all men, nor should we Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions, pg.157 try.

uneteenth, an annual commemoration of the end of slavery in the United States after the Civil War, has been celebrated by African Americans since the late 1800s.

On June 19, 1866, formerly enslaved people in Galveston, Texas, celebrated a year of emancipation, or freedom, with the "Juneteenth" holiday. Juneteenth celebrations quickly spread to the rest of the country, and the date continues to be the oldest known tradition honoring the end of slavery in the United States.



President Biden signed legislation in 2021 making Juneteenth, a federal holiday, after interest in the day was renewed during the summer of 2020 and the nationwide protests that followed the police killings of Black Americans including George Floyd and Breonna Taylor.

CONCEPT SIX

"On behalf of AA as a whole, our General Service Conference has the principal responsibility for the maintenance of our World Services, and it traditionally has the final decision respecting large matters of general policy and finance. But the conference also recognizes that the chief initiative and the active responsibility in most of these matters should be exercised primarily by the Trustee members of the Conference when they act among themselves as the General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous."



FATHER ED DOWLING, SPIRITUAL SPONSOR TO BILL W.

Father Edward Dowling's, guidance transformed Alcoholics Anonymous co-founder Bill Wilson's life and deepened the spirituality of the twelvestep movement. Bill Wilson's legacy is one of the greatest of any person of modern times. Time magazine placed him at No. 20 on its list of the most important people of the 20th century. But whenever Wilson himself had the opportunity to name the greatest human being he had ever met, he had but one answer: Father Edward

Dowling. Jesuit Father Ed Dowling (1898-1960) rescued Bill Wilson



from debilitating depression and gave him the spiritual guidance he needed to bring AA to international prominence. Although not an alcoholic himself, he came to devote his ministry to helping people in recovery-not only alcoholics but also people in troubled marriages (as a co-founder of the Cana Conference) and those suffering from nervous disorders (as an early champion of Recovery, Inc., now known as Recovery International). He was also a champion of civil rights and other social-justice issues, and his pastoral interests presaged the priorities of the Church under Pope Francis.

The additional stigma of being a member of a marginalized community such as the LGBTQ community cause some to manage the additional stressors by using mind-altering substances.

Homosexuality is now seen as a normal variation of human sexual and emotional expression, allowing, it is hoped, a nonpathological and nonprejudicial view of homosexuality as well as of LGBT people. LGBT people and homosexual and bisexual behavior are found in almost all societies and cultures in the world and throughout history (Herdt, 1996). But the degree of tolerance and acceptance of them has varied considerably in different periods of history and from country to country, culture to culture, and community to community.
